

How do we make sense of suffering?

Paul wrestled mightily with this issue through his years as an apostle, spreading the good news about Jesus through the ancient Roman world. He suffered much in the service of others. Paul gives us a glimpse into the secret of his endurance, in his second letter to the church in Corinth.

In June our lectionary leads us through 2 Corinthians. We'll take advantage of that opportunity to explore this, the most intensely personal of all of Paul's letters. What follows is an introduction to Paul's letter, adapted from the ESV Study Bible. It will support our Sunday preaching series for the weeks ahead.

2 Corinthians Author and Date

The apostle Paul is the undisputed author of 2 Corinthians, which he wrote from Macedonia around A.D. 55/56, a year or so after writing 1 Corinthians, and a year before he wrote his letter to the Romans from Corinth (Acts 20:2–3). Despite its name, Second Corinthians is actually the fourth letter that Paul sent to the church he founded in Corinth (Acts 18:1–17), together with the house churches "in the whole province of Achaia," of which Corinth was the capital. The four letters are (1) the previous letter mentioned in 1 Corinthians 5:9; (2) our 1 Corinthians; (3) the tearful, severe letter mentioned in 2 Corinthians 2:3–4; and (4) our 2 Corinthians.

Theme

The central theme of 2 Corinthians is the relationship between suffering and the power of the Spirit in Paul's Paul's opponents in the church called into question his motives in organizing a collection for believers in Judea (8:20-21; cf. 2:17; 12:14-18), his personal courage (10:10-11; 11:21), and argued that Paul suffered too much to be a Spirit-filled apostle of the risen Christ. In response, Paul argues that his weakness as an apostle is the very means by which believers are comforted (1:3-11) and God in Christ is made known in the world (2:14-17; 4:7-12; 6:3-10; 11:23b-33). In fact, Paul's sufferings embody the cross of Christ, while his endurance amid adversity manifests the resurrection power of the Spirit (12:7-10). Paul's suffering as an apostle is thus the very means God uses to reveal his glory (1:3-4, 11, 20; 4:15; 9:11–15; 10:17–18).

Paul therefore sees a close tie between the Corinthians' acceptance of his ministry and the genuineness of their faith. To reject Paul and his proclamation is to reject Christ himself, since Paul's message, ministry, and manner of life are one. This explains why 2 Corinthians is the most personal of all of Paul's letters, filled with deep emotion.

Purpose, Occasion, and Background

Second Corinthians is a glimpse into the complicated history between Paul and the Corinthian church, which must be reconstructed from the evidence available today. Originally, Paul had planned to travel from Ephesus through Macedonia to Corinth (see map) on his way back to Jerusalem to deliver the money he had collected for the believers in Judea (1 Cor. 16:5-9). In the meantime, he sent Timothy to visit the Corinthians on his behalf (Acts 19:22; 1 Cor. 16:10-11). When Timothy arrived in Corinth, he found that the church was in turmoil, most likely in response to the arrival of Paul's opponents from the east. When Paul learned of this he decided to proceed immediately to Corinth to resolve the issues first, then travel on to Macedonia before returning to Corinth for a second visit on his way to Jerusalem.

Paul's visit, however, turned out to be very "painful" as a result of the church's open rebellion against him (2:1, 5–8; 7:8–13; 11:4). Paul decided it was best to suffer humiliation and leave, without retaliating, in order to extend mercy to the Corinthians (1:23–24). Once back in Ephesus, Paul sent Titus back to Corinth with a tearful and severe letter (now lost), warning the church of God's judgment if they did not repent (2:3–4; 7:8–16).

To Paul's great joy, the majority of the Corinthians did repent, which Paul discovered when he met Titus in Macedonia (7:5–16). But there was still a rebellious minority who, under the influence of Paul's opponents (11:12–21), continued to reject Paul and his gospel. In response, and as yet another act of mercy, Paul wrote 2 Corinthians from Macedonia in anticipation of his third, impending visit to Corinth before going on to Jerusalem (12:14; 13:1).

The mixed nature of the church in Corinth, not to mention the opponents whom Paul addresses indirectly throughout the letter, explains the complex nature of 2 Corinthians and its sometimes sudden shifts in focus and tone. Paul's letter is an extended defense of the legitimacy of his apostolic ministry. He seeks to accomplish three overlapping purposes: (1) to strengthen the faithful majority and the purity of the church (primarily chs. 1-7); (2) to complete the collection as the expression of their repentance (primarily chs. 8-9); and (3) to offer the rebellious minority one more chance to repent before Paul returns to judge those still rejecting him and his message (primarily chs. 10-13). Thus, chapters 1-7 focus primarily on the past track record of Paul's ministry, chapters 8-9 on the present responsibility of the repentant, and chapters 10-13 on the future judgment of those still in rebellion against the gospel.


Timeline of Paul's Ministry

Key Themes

- 1. The cross of Christ, embodied in the suffering of his apostle, unmasks the erroneous teaching of "false apostles" and "servants of Satan." (11:13-15)
- 2. In fulfillment of Jer. 31:31–34 and Ezek. 36:26–27, Paul is a servant of the new covenant (2 Cor. 3:6), whose ministry and message of the cross mediates God's Spirit and righteousness to believers. (3:3, 6–9; 5:14–15, 21)
- 3. Endurance amid adversity and Christlike behavior, both made possible by the grace of God, are the greatest display of God's presence, power, and glory in this fallen world. (1:12–14; 6:1, 14–7:1; 9:13–15; 12:7–10; 13:4)



- 4. The presence and power of the Spirit transforms believers into the image of Christ, which is the dawning of the new creation characterized by the righteousness of God. Believers therefore embody the new creation of the new covenant by living for the sake of others. This is made possible by the reconciliation with God brought about by the cross. (3:18; 4:4, 6; 5:15, 17–21)
- 5. Repentance expresses itself in holiness, which is defined as a purity-producing love for God and his church and a unity-creating love for one's neighbor. (6:14–7:1; chs. 8–9)
- 6. Christ, as Savior, is also the universal Judge, who will one day pass judgment on all people according to their deeds. In anticipation of this day, the Spirit transforms those in whom he dwells as a guarantee of the "eternal weight of glory" to come for believers at the resurrection. (1:14, 22; 3:6, 8–9, 18; 5:5, 9–11)

Shane Ayers

What passion and experience would you bring to the Vestry?

Small group bible study, adult formation, LEM, acolytes, website design and upkeep, representative to Diocesan Council, Vestry – including vestry member, treasurer, Jr. Warden, and Sr. Warden.

What opportunities and challenges do you see for St. Peter's in the next few years?

We live in a world that is increasingly unfamiliar with the Christian tradition and so sees no reason to come to a church to find comfort, hope and joy. Instead, the church ignored as irrelevant, or even mocked and scorned. We're further challenged in this as the Episcopal Church as a whole continues to drift from proclaiming the Gospel to echoing what is in vogue in the world. At St. Peter's we do much to teach and live the Gospel. This is powerful stuff and we are in a great position to take it to the world around us.

On a more pragmatic note, St. Peter's continues to operate at a point where our desires for doing more in ministry exceed our financial means to implement them. Our opportunity here is the deep well of ministry ideas we have to draw on and the skills we've gained in being wise stewards of the resources that God does grant us.

How would you as a leader address those challenges and opportunities?

I would do all I can to help in setting a direction for increased and focused engagement with the community around us, looking to make St. Peter's known as a place where caring and growth take place. What passion and experience would you bring to the Vestry?

secularized environment, for 8 years prior to moving to Virginia. I have a Master's of Divinity and PhD level coursework on top of that in the field of New Testament. I have a great passion particularly for spiritual formation, study of scripture and theology, formation of Christian community, and adult education. For the last 17 years I have been involved in Adult education in the various churches that we have attended.

What ministries or events have you been involved in since joining St. Peter's?

Primarily, I have led several Adult Formation classes over the past year. Currently, I am beginning work in the position of Adult Formation coordinator. Also, outside of St. Peters, I have continued to work for InterVarsity Christian Fellowship, typically leading and designing several retreats and training events for graduate students at DC and Baltimore area universities. Recently, I have reduced from paid staff to volunteer.

What opportunities and challenges do you see for St. Peter's in the next few years?

Thoughtful expansion of the church and church programs will both be an opportunity and challenge. I see a real opportunity to ask the questions of how does St. Peter's serve the greater Christian community in the area and how it serves the community of Purcellville. I see an increasing challenge of secularization of this area and broadly in our culture,

and St. Peter's cannot only serve to proclaim Christ in the midst of that and be faithful in this generation, but be faithful stewards of the Christian tradition for future generations. We are in an era of intense cultural changes on many levels, that even touch the question what it means to be human.

How would you as a leader address those challenges and opportunities?

Foundational to everything is prayer and reliance upon God. As a leader, I would endeavor to serve and seek to enable others to be their best and do their best. Leaders must be humble and want the best for others and other leaders as well. Leaders must invest in those they serve and also apprentice others to be leaders. I think as a leader, I must ask the necessary questions on top of prayer to help discern vision and expressed identity of the group. Leaders need to be able to invite all to feel a part of that vision and own that vision as their own, and again, I'd endeavor to do this. Leaders need to ask the hard questions about what good things need to be past up or cut back, in order to serve to create space for things that better serve the community based upon discerned vision. The whole of programs and activities offered and structure created serve to create a space for a culture to grow. The more cohesive the structure is to the vision, the more likely it is that the culture grows in accordance with that vision, like a trained vine growing on a trellis. Leaders can't make growth happen or the exact shape of that growth, but they determine how the trellis is shaped and its dimensions. In that sense as well leaders can marvel at what actually grows and fills the trellis. As the Apostle Paul says, it is God that causes the growth (1 Cor 3:6).

What are three areas of particular interest you would like to work on or lead?

- 1. Spiritual Formation (Discipleship, small group coordination, adult ed, prayer, teaching etc.)
- 2. Event planning (designing/planning outreach, training, or other special type of events)
- 3. Development of resources (theological, spaces/places, etc.)

New Vestry "Kneading the Dough"

The vestry took a full weekend in May to orient our three new members (Shane Ayers, Tom Coate, and Jon Corbett) to our vestry team and tasks. We travelled to Kent Island in the Chesapeake where we ate and drank and had a grand time together for two nights away. It is exciting to watch the sunset over water and to really get to know each other.

And we also did some work! We put sustained time into analyzing the



data recently gathered in our hedgehog research. I want to say "Thank You!" on behalf of the vestry for the research you all gathered from our congregation, the "man on the street" and community stakeholders. And with all the time we had together we were also able to dedicate sustained time to spiritual discernment using the familiar "Listening Hearts" approach. It is really good to be able to listen to God together. What a rejuvenating and creative weekend!

In our research so far we've randomly interviewed 71 people in our community, talked to ... stakeholders and gathered survey input from 123 people at St. Peter's. That data gives us a lot of confidence as we move forward. We are now dealing with really real realities, rather than merely making our best guess. We can now integrate our "gut" AND data in a way that is clear and specific, coherent and concrete. It greatly increases the likelihood that "This might just work!"

When Jesus looked out at the crowds of people he felt compassion for them. They are like sheep without a shepherd. Seeing the need, he called his friends to work with him to make a difference. Our goal is to home in on a concrete "crying need" in our community. We want to feel what Jesus feels about it, to spur our passion and harness our competence as a congregation to serve these people in a way that will change their lives. It'll be our "Hedgehog Concept," the ONE thing we can do to make a difference for our neighbors.

Once we've discerned the need and articulated a strategy we'll develop a plan to make it happen. With the plan will come clarity about our future facilities expansion and renovation needs. Remember that discussion?! We hope to be able to put it all together in a coherent picture in October: a compelling vision, a concrete plan, and specifics about our future facilities.

Won't that be nice!?

What's next? The vestry will gather with the Hedgehog team again, on June 2, to further refine the idea we are developing and see if we can't get it ready to present to the congregation sometime in June. If you all like what we've got, then the hardcore strategic planning will begin in July and continue through summer into fall.

Calling All Canvassers

In my "stakeholder interview" with the Mayor Fraser, he asked if we could help him do research for the town, like we've been doing for our Hedgehog. The town council is planning a research effort in P'ville that will involve canvassing teams going door to door to 1800 residents within town. He asked if we could help. I told him I'd raise up 10 canvassers to be part of that effort in the first half of June.

Global Media Outreach—Part 1: The Mission

I would like to tell you about the missionary work I have been involved in for over a year now. My work takes me all over the world. I have traveled to almost every country in Africa and to the Middle East, including sensitive countries like Iran, Iraq and Afghanistan. I often get over to India, Southeast Asia and South Asia. Once I went to Mongolia. On occasion my work keeps me here in the US, but more often than not I am in Africa. In fact this morning I just returned from Nigeria.

I volunteer as an Online Missionary (OM) for an organization called Global Media Outreach (GMO). Let me tell you how it works.

First of all, just about every one in the world has a cell phone. Well, not everyone, but the numbers are greater than you'd think. Most middle class folks in developing countries have skipped over the landline links in favor of cell phone and smart phone technology. More and more people have access to computers and laptops through numerous initiatives to increase Internet access, and Internet cafes thrive in urban neighborhoods around the world. It is primarily young people who have this increased access to the World Wide Web.

Secondly, just about every one in the world has questions about the meaning of life. People everywhere wonder why they exist and why they suffer. Some people are facing loneliness, addictions, suicide, abuse, divorce and hopelessness.

When people need answers to the deep questions of life, we all know where to go - to the omniscient, omnipresent god in the sky - google.com. They type in questions like: Why am I sick? Is there a God? Are Jesus and Mohammed equals? Why did God allow my child to die? How can I stop sinning? Why is there evil? Every day millions of people do a search on the Internet for a spiritual term. People are seeking answers. Just this past January during the Paris terrorism incidents, hits on GMO sites in France alone were up 244%.

Through the magic of hyperlinking, these questioners often end up at one of GMO's many websites like godlife.com. If they stick with it they will read about the existence of God and the help and saving grace of Jesus Christ. GMO is dedicated to making sure people find the truth in Jesus. With nowhere to go, people are turning to the Internet in astonishing numbers trying to fill the emptiness inside. Christians need to be there to meet them at their crossroads when they are most ready to listen. The GMO websites invite browsers to connect with a Christian for further information or help.

This is where I step in. Every morning I open up an email from someone who is looking for something. My job is to respond to him and pray for him.

I get all manner of questions and requests. Why did Jesus have to die? How do you know there is a God? Aren't all religions the same? I can't believe in a God who sends people to hell. How can I stop masturbating? I'm a drug addict; can Jesus help me? How do I really know God has forgiven me? How can I grow in my faith? Please pray for my brother's village that was attacked by Boko Haram. In the past year I have received hundreds of questions and requests as varied as the number.

I know some of you are wondering, "How are you qualified to answer these kinds of questions? You didn't become a Christian until you were forty-eight years old. You didn't even own a Bible till then and haven't memorized many verses. What do you know about theology, sociology and psychology?"

You're right. I am not an expert on any of these things. I will explain in my next article how I am given the ability to respond to these questions. But I know what I am not to do, I am not to preach the Gospel of Debby, it's not in the Bible, I checked. On the GMO site from which I respond I am given many resources. I spend a minimum of an hour every day making sure that my responses are biblically correct. I have a mentor who checks on me to make sure I am responding appropriately.

My main mission is to communicate the love of Jesus. I always address my new contact's question or comment to the best of my ability. I ask open-ended questions that encourage them to write back. I encourage them to take the next step – salvation or recommitment, pray, read the Bible, and connect with other Christians in community. And always I pray for my new contacts and ongoing disciples.

I receive emails from people who communicate in English. GMO has many thousands of missionaries representing many languages so we can effectively reach the diverse range of Internet users. Sometimes I must reassign the emails to others in our group who are better equipped to respond to suicide, sexual issues, drug abuse and sometimes a theological issue just too complex for me.

GMO uses cutting edge technology to improve our communications with people around the globe and to increase our access to good resources. GMO adjusts quickly to new realities. They have just added SMS formatting for OMs ready to communicate with the

millions of young folk who strictly text message. We receive regular training and are mentored by experienced OMs.

A friend encouraged me to get involved in GMO because my gifts match this ministry. I like to write and I have the time to write since I am retired. I also have a huge heart for the international community having lived and traveled all over the world and having had a career teaching English to speakers of other languages both abroad and here in the states.

I know some may claim that online evangelism, done in the safety of the home, is not 'real' evangelism. But anyone sharing the Gospel online has a very vital and real ministry.

In Matthew 24:1 we are called to preach the Gospel to all the world.

In today's world, preaching to all the world has become an electronic reality. Every desktop, cellphone, and iPad will enable the gospel to be available to the entire world.

Also, online evangelism allows us to meet seekers where they are. GMO's secure response system allows for communication between OMs and seekers to be safe and anonymous. People search anonymously and expect a safe and anonymous response. Some people are uncomfortable meeting with a Christian, or, for those in sensitive countries, they may even fear for their lives! The sites not only present the gospel, but also provide a direct connection with a Christian. That's what I give them.

A young woman from the UK who was in drug rehab wrote and asked how Jesus could help her recover. Danielle came to me anonymously, yet she was able to open up about her life and I was able to open up to her about Jesus.

These natural gifts of mine may be small, but I know I serve the larger purpose of getting the gospel to the ends of the earth.

I am privileged to work with a mission whose vision is to give everyone on earth multiple opportunities to know Jesus. In my next article I want to share with you what I have gained in the past year by serving with this ministry.

St. Peter's Fourth Mission Trip to Guatemala

On June 20th St. Peter's is sending a seven person team Guatemala to support Redeemer's House missionaries Todd and Maureen Erickson in their ministry in the village of Santiago Zamora. Three team members are from St. Peter's and four are from other churches. The St. Peter's group includes Maggie Snyder, Bridget Wagstaff and Bob Loker. This is the fourth St. Peter's trip in o f support the Ericksons' ministry.



As in the past, we will be teaching and helping with an after school program now numbering about 60 kids. We will also be supporting other mercy ministries in the village and spending time at Casa de la Esperanza, a home for severely disabled children in a nearby town.

A special event this year will be a village photography project. Most village families have never had a family photograph taken. After village church services on Sunday our team will take family photographs and will print and frame the pictures on the spot to be given to the families. We expect to be photographing at least 50 families (but we will be prepared for 100). Can you imagine what a gift that will be for someone who has never had a framed family photo!

Redeemer's House receives monthly support from St. Peter's, and Casa de la Esperanza receives support from the Wednesday Night Bible Study. We invite you to partner with us in providing extra support for this trip. We are placing a collection box in McCray Hall for the Ericksons' "wish list". The list includes after school and craft supplies (markers, crayons, sparkles, pipe cleaners, jump ropes, washable kids paint, play-doh, miracle bubbles; and also vitamins; acid reducer tablets; and pain relievers and small bottles of children's shampoo. 
Finally, please be praying that Christ would be evident to the villagers, Redeemer's House, and to our team during our time in Guatemala.




Here's what you can look forward to.
