Come for fun. Come to serve. Come with friends. (See page 11)




Summer Upgrades

If you haven't seen the sample paneling in McCray Hall, take a look. It is in the simple, expressive "Shaker" style. We are hoping that in June the whole hall will be similarly clad in paneling with new window treatments. These will make a huge difference in the look and feel of the room. We will need some volunteer help, both skilled and unskilled, to bring the paneling project to completion in as inexpensive way as possible. I'll need some grunt work to help cut and transport and hang the panels. I'll need some skilled work to trim and paint them. Let me know how you'd like to help.

Looking beyond that, we have funding now for a *reredos* in the Chapel. Reredos is an ornamental screen covering the wall at the back of an altar. (See the picture below.) You'll recognize the existing altar. The three panels behind it, in matching walnut, will be the reredos. Pictured in those panels are icons, which our own Tamara Tyler is planning to paint in the months ahead. The icon of Christ, called *Pantocrator* or 'Ruler of All,' will be approximately life-size!

Notice also the wainscot paneling to either side of the reredos. We have no plan to complete it at present, but when that day comes, we'll run the paneling in walnut around the Chapel, to include the partitions and pillars that separate that space from the Nave. That project awaits funding from a generous person wanting to memorialize someone dearly departed.



The Chapel (dedicated in the fall of 2013) was made possible by memorial gifts in honor of Betty Lou Reckmeyer (March 25, 1922 – June 23, 2011).

It's called the Chapel of the Incarnation. 'Incarnation' says that in Jesus of Nazareth, "God became Man" and lived among us. He makes his presence known in every-day life.

'Incarnation' is also a play on words that evokes Betty Lou's favorite flower, the carnation, a very special bloom. With a history dating back thousands of years, it's not surprising that carnations are rich with symbolism and meaning.

The name is derived from the Latin "carnis" (flesh) referring to the flower's original pinkish color, and the "incarnation" of God-made-flesh. The carnation often appears in paintings of the Virgin Mary enjoying the flower with Jesus.



St. Peter's Renovation and Maintenance Plan

A sub-committee of the Renovation Team met to deliberate on what maintenance and renovation needs can be realized at St Peter's in the near term as the larger picture on potential land acquisition and building expansion is still under consideration. After much deliberation the following is what was determined to be done according to present funds available.

Maintenance -

- Replace 2 toilets in men's bathroom. Needs to be done due to school starting in August
- Fill pot holes in Parking lot with gravel.
- Remove Pine tree by playground
- Stain Picnic Tables and dumpster fence
- Mulch Playground
- · Replace broken kitchen window with clear glass

Renovation

- Window Treatments for McCray Hall
- Install Basketball hoop. Possible Eagle Scout project. Need to asphalt ½ court area (see below)
- Paint McCray Hall with installing Wainscot
- Add dishwasher, and replace two ranges in kitchen (see photo on right)
- Paint Aluminum trim on outside windows of McCray Hall
- Paint and caulk downstairs Bathrooms

These are projects that are needed for enhancements to the facility prior to renting our space to the Montessori school starting this August, and are affordable given the funds we have been allocated/donated. A leadership team of **David Ramsey, Chris Daniels, and Joe Matthews** will steer these efforts, build the necessary labor volunteer force, and a work schedule which would complete all of this work by September 6, 2016. We invite the congregation to pitch in where they can using their skills and available time. Let's enhance the visibility of St. Peter's in our community together!




Two new ranges were installed in the church kitchen on May 12, 2016!

Allder Montessori School is coming to St. Peter's! Beginning in August 2016, we will join forces with this excellent, western Loudoun-based home school coop to offer both a primary program (ages 3-6, half and full day) and an elementary program (ages 6-12) on site at St. Peter's church. Classes are five days per week. Each program incorporates an atrium following the *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* method and follows the teachings and principles of Dr. Maria Montessori. Allder is currently accepting applications for children ages 3-5, and 6-10 year olds with previous Montessori and homeschooling experience. Allder Montessori will begin its fifth year of operations in August.

Allder's Montessori classrooms are filled with simple yet beautiful materials scientifically developed by Maria Montessori and her associates. The classrooms feature mixed aged groups, fostering independence and providing leadership opportunities for the older children. Careful observation on the part of the teacher, followed by one-on-one lessons in primary and small group lessons in elementary ensure that children receive individualized attention.

The work of the children is self-directed, gently guided by the teachers, as children progress in each subject area at their own pace. The children are encouraged to work together in groups, and support each other's

explorations. This method builds a high degree of self-confidence, love of learning, well developed social skills and an overall joyful disposition. Instruction in the Primary classroom includes presentations in math, language, sensorial skills, and practical life. The comprehensive Elementary program incorporates the "Great Lessons" to inspire the child's wonder and awe at the Universe and the Earth, Life, Humans, Language, and Numbers. Classes seamlessly incorporate the outdoor church property into teaching methods, complementing classroom lessons by exploring nature, as well as the natural resources available within Loudoun County.

Allder Montessori School is organized as a home school coop under the laws of the state of Virginia and Loudoun County. It is being developed by the families who are using it. We are motivated by our desire for more effective educational solutions for our children, with the additional goal of nurturing an authentically Christian and vibrant community.

Welcome to the Revolution

When I was a child, growing up in the 1970s, the sexual revolution was being rapidly institutionalized through the spread of no-fault divorce laws, contraceptive technology, pornography, and the judicial imposition of abortion-on-demand. The mass media was eagerly greasing the skids by promoting casual sex and ridiculing the norms that had governed the West since the conversion of the barbarians.


The Revolution continues to grind its grim course in my children's generation. A bizarre ideology, which seeks to erase all distinctions and creaturely limits, is wielding increasingly exclusive power in the opinion-making sectors of our society. It asserts that sexual identity is *entirely fluid*, and sexual behavior must be *utterly unbound*. This movement seeks to impose a radical subjectivism, in which "truth" can only be defined by how "I feel," or what I currently "identify" as. To such feelings ALL must now be made to bow.

Like the Queen in *Alice in Wonderland* we are being asked to believe "six impossible things before breakfast." Enormous pressure is brought to bear to compel our assent to The Next Impossible Thing. In June of 2015 it was Bruce Jenner. As if by magic, one of the greatest male athletes of the 20th century is now a woman. As if on command, everyone who matters now calls him "her." Fast forward one year and suddenly we must open access to school bathrooms, dressing rooms and locker rooms to everyone based on what they currently "identify" as. If Brer Fox "identifies" as a chicken, by all means, let him into the henhouse! "You're not transphobic are you?"

Expressions of puzzlement, incomprehension, or principled opposition are often met with charges of fear and bigotry (techniques 20th century Communists called *agitprop* and *disinformazia*). But that's just the beginning. Advocates have now taken up the cudgel of federal power to impose the new norm by presidential decree. If our schools are out of compliance with the Department of Compliance we now face lawsuits and loss of funding. All must now be made to bow.

It kind of makes a guy wonder: What will June of NEXT year bring?

Don't care to wait and see? Maybe it's time to lift up your voice and say, "Enough!" I offer excerpts from two recent publications as a factual antidote to faith in this ideology. The first resource is a recent



statement published by the American College of Pediatricians, printed below in full.

Gender Ideology Harms Children

The American College of Pediatricians urges educators and legislators to reject all policies that condition children to accept as normal a life of chemical and surgical impersonation of the opposite sex. Facts – not ideology – determine reality.

1. Human sexuality is an objective biological binary trait: "XY" and "XX" are genetic markers of health - not genetic markers of a disorder. The norm for human design is to be conceived either male or female. Human sexuality is binary by design with the obvious purpose being the reproduction and flourishing of our species. This principle is self-evident. The exceedingly rare disorders of sex development (DSDs), including but not limited to testicular feminization and congenital adrenal hyperplasia, are all medically identifiable deviations from the sexual binary norm, and are rightly recognized as disorders of human design. Individuals with DSDs do not constitute a third sex.1 2. No one is born with a gender. Everyone is born with a biological sex. Gender (an awareness and sense of oneself as male or female) is a sociological and psychological concept; not an objective biological one. No one is born with an awareness of themselves as male or female; this awareness develops over time and, like all developmental processes, may be derailed by a child's subjective perceptions, relationships, and adverse experiences from infancy forward. People who identify as "feeling like the opposite sex" or "somewhere in between" do not comprise a third sex. They remain biological men or biological women.2,3,4



- 3. A person's belief that he or she is something they are not is, at best, a sign of confused thinking. When an otherwise healthy biological boy believes he is a girl, or an otherwise healthy biological girl believes she is a boy, an objective psychological problem exists that lies in the mind not the body, and it should be treated as such. These children suffer from gender dysphoria. Gender dysphoria (GD), formerly listed as Gender Identity Disorder (GID), is a recognized mental disorder in the most recent edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of the American Psychiatric Association (DSM-V).5 The psychodynamic and social learning theories of GD/GID have never been disproved.2,4,5 4. Puberty is not a disease and puberty-blocking hormones can be dangerous. Reversible or not, pubertyblocking hormones induce a state of disease - the absence of puberty - and inhibit growth and fertility in a previously biologically healthy child.6
- 5. According to the DSM-V, as many as 98% of gender confused boys and 88% of gender confused girls eventually accept their biological sex after naturally passing through puberty.5
- 6. Children who use puberty blockers to impersonate the opposite sex will require cross-sex hormones in late adolescence. Cross-sex hormones (testosterone and estrogen) are associated with dangerous health risks including but not limited to high blood pressure, blood clots, stroke and cancer.7,8,9,10
- 7. Rates of suicide are twenty times greater among adults who use cross-sex hormones and undergo sex reassignment surgery, even in Sweden which is among the most LGBTQ affirming countries.11 What compassionate and reasonable person would condemn young children to this fate knowing that after puberty as many as 88% of girls and 98% of boys will eventually accept reality and achieve a state of mental and physical health?
- 8. Conditioning children into believing that a lifetime of chemical and surgical impersonation of the opposite sex is normal and healthful is child abuse. Endorsing gender discordance as normal via public education and legal policies will confuse children and parents, leading more children to present to "gender clinics" where they will be given puberty-blocking drugs. This, in turn, virtually ensures that they will "choose" a lifetime of carcinogenic and otherwise toxic cross-sex hormones, and likely consider unnecessary surgical mutilation of their healthy body parts as young adults.

The second resource is from Dr. Paul R. McHugh, the former psychiatrist-in-chief for Johns Hopkins Hospital and its current Distinguished Service Professor of Psychiatry, published an op ed in the Wall Street Journal. He argues that transgenderism is a "mental disorder" that merits treatment, that sex change is "biologically impossible," and that people who promote sexual reassignment surgery are collaborating with and promoting a mental disorder. I've selected two large excerpts below.

The government and media alliance advancing the transgender cause has gone into overdrive in recent weeks. On May 30, a U.S. Department of Health and Human Services review board ruled that Medicare can pay for the



"reassignment" surgery sought by the transgendered—those who say that they don't identify with their biological sex. Earlier last month Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel said that he was "open" to lifting a ban on transgender individuals serving in the military. Time magazine, seeing the trend, ran a cover story for its June 9 issue called "The Transgender Tipping Point: America's next civil rights frontier."

Yet policy makers and the media are doing no favors either to the public or the transgendered by treating their confusions as a right in need of defending rather than as a mental disorder that deserves understanding, treatment and prevention. This intensely felt sense of being transgendered constitutes a mental disorder in two respects. The first is that the idea of sex misalignment is simply mistaken—it does not correspond with physical reality. The second is that it can lead to grim psychological outcomes.

The transgendered suffer a disorder of "assumption" like those in other disorders familiar to psychiatrists. With the transgendered, the disordered assumption is that the individual differs from what seems given in nature—namely one's maleness or femaleness. Other kinds of disordered assumptions are held by those who suffer from anorexia and bulimia nervosa, where the assumption that departs from physical reality is the belief by the dangerously thin that they are overweight.

With body dysmorphic disorder, an often socially crippling condition, the individual is consumed by the assumption "I'm ugly." These disorders occur in subjects who have come to believe that some of their psycho-social conflicts or problems will be resolved if they can change the way that they appear to others. Such ideas work like ruling passions in their subjects' minds and tend to be accompanied by a solipsistic argument.

For the transgendered, this argument holds that one's feeling of "gender" is a conscious, subjective sense that, being in one's mind, cannot be questioned by others. The individual often seeks not just society's tolerance of this "personal truth" but affirmation of it. Here rests the support

for "transgender equality," the demands for government payment for medical and surgical treatments, and for access to all sex-based public roles and privileges.

With this argument, advocates for the transgendered have persuaded several states—including California, New Jersey and Massachusetts—to pass laws barring psychiatrists, even with parental permission, from striving to restore natural gender feelings to a transgender minor.

That government can intrude into parents' rights to seek help in guiding their children indicates how powerful these advocates have become.

How to respond? Psychiatrists obviously must challenge the solipsistic concept that what is in the mind cannot be questioned. Disorders of consciousness, after all, represent psychiatry's domain; declaring them off-limits would eliminate the field. Many will recall how, in the 1990s, an accusation of parental sex abuse of children was deemed unquestionable by the solipsists of the "recovered memory" craze...

There are subgroups of the transgendered, and for none does "reassignment" seem apt. One... subgroup consists of young men and women susceptible to suggestion from "everything is normal" sex education, amplified by Internet chat groups. These are the transgender subjects most like anorexia nervosa patients: They become persuaded that seeking a drastic physical change will banish their psychosocial problems. "Diversity" counselors in their schools, rather like cult leaders, may encourage these young people to distance themselves from their families and offer advice



on rebutting arguments against having transgender surgery. Treatments here must begin with removing the young person from the suggestive environment and offering a countermessage in family therapy.

Then there is the subgroup of very young, often prepubescent children who notice distinct sex roles in the culture and, exploring how they fit in, begin imitating the opposite sex. Misguided doctors at medical centers including Boston's Children's Hospital have begun trying to treat this behavior by administering puberty-delaying hormones to render later sex-change surgeries less onerous—even though the drugs stunt the children's growth and risk causing sterility. Given that close to 80% of such children would abandon their confusion and grow naturally into adult life if untreated, these medical interventions come close to child abuse. A better way to help these children: with devoted parenting.

At the heart of the problem is confusion over the nature of the transgendered. "Sex change" is biologically impossible. People who undergo sex-reassignment surgery do not change from men to women or vice versa. Rather, they become feminized men or masculinized women. Claiming that this is civil-rights matter and encouraging surgical intervention is in reality to collaborate with and promote a mental disorder.

Stephen Ministry

What it is:

• Stephen Ministry is a one-on-one lay caring ministry that serves members of the church and the community. Stephen Ministry training equips and empowers lay caregivers ("Stephen Ministers") to provide high quality, confidential, Christ-centered care to people who are hurting.

How it's done:

- To start a Stephen Ministry, the church selects and sends leaders in the congregation to a Leadership Training Course a week long conference where the Stephen Leaders receive in depth training that teaches the resources used to lead Stephen Ministry, develops the key skills for leadership, and gets people excited about the ministry.
- A church that wants to start a Stephen Ministry program selects leaders in the congregation to become "Stephen Leaders" and travel to a week long conference where they receive in depth Leadership Training.
- The Stephen Leaders return to their congregations and conduct 50 hours worth of training to the Stephen Ministers. A Stephen Minister will get paired up with a Care Receiver, meeting with that person once a week for about an hour. Twice a month, Stephen Ministers meet with their Stephen Leaders for supervision and continuing education.

Stephen Ministry is a fantastic opportunity to care for those around us, not only within St. Peters, but within the community at large. During the inevitable times of trial, transition, and loss, a caring relationship with someone who will faithfully listen, empathize, and encourage with Christ's love and care can be tremendously powerful.



The Guatemala team is putting finishing touches on preparations for the mission trip to Guatemala beginning June 18th.

We are grateful for the supplies of craft materials and health products that St. Peter's parishioners have donated. We have used some of our cash contributions buy to Spanish language books for Redeemer's House, our host mission. We are also taking down a large quantity of ThickenUp. thickens ThickenUp



liquids and pureed foods and makes it easier for the disabled children to swallow.

Among other activities, the team will be teaching Bible, working at a children's' feeding station, and helping out with an after school program in several different locations. We will also be doing a family photography project and purchasing textiles from local weavers for sale at St. Peter's in the fall. All profits are then given to Redeemer's House.

I recently returned from a week's training in Orlando with StoryRunners, a ministry of CRU (Campus Crusade for Christ). StoryRunners equips missionaries to teach the Bible transculturally to oral learners. Most of the people we teach in Guatemala learn orally. In fact, in the rural areas many of the pastors have only a sixth grade education. The team will be adopting some of it's training for oral learners.



I will stay in Guatemala an extra week to train pastors and church leaders to disciple with a focus on reaching oral learners. That week will be sponsored by the International Missionary Network which ministers in the highlands and also in isolated villages on the Atlantic Coast.



What you need:


- White construction paper (11" x 13" sheet)
- Pencil
- · Black permanent marker
- · Crayons or paint

What you do:

- In the center of the paper, trace your foot in pencil. Darken the outline with marker.
- Color or paint the footprint. Let it dry.
- Trace your father's foot (same one) on top of your footprint (with yours in the middle of his).
- Color or paint his footprint. Let it dry.
- Sign your names and the date at the bottom.
