God, The Body and You

The God of the Bible is unique among all the gods named in human faith. Our Lord is both "above it all" AND "part of it all". In philosophical terms, God is BOTH transcendent and

immanent.

All the gods of the world's religions are EITHER transcendent OR immanent. For example, on one hand there is Islam, in which Allah is a god of extreme transcendence. "Allah akbar!" On the other hand, there is Hinduism, where god is so "part of it all" that god is indistinguishable from "it all". "All is One," or Brahman. The God of the Bible is as transcendent as Allah AND as intimately present in creation as Brahman.

In the Bible's narrative the great God has come down. The Big One was born a human being. He is Jesus. With a human face he showed us who God is. He lived as one of us and made the distant God present to us. He did what was needed to reconcile our broken relationship with God, and restore us to rejoice in God's presence.

But Jesus' time with us on earth was limited. Having completed his mission he returned to the Father. Just before he left Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit, who would extend Jesus' presence through the Church and to each of us. "Behold" he said, "I am with you always."

He sent the Holy Spirit to complete his work in the world, to make the whole creation new. He does it through us. God the *Holy Spirit brings the divine presence near* to each of us and to our community gathered in worship. God's Spirit moves among us in our study and proclamation of his word, and sharing the sacraments in the liturgy. The Spirit of Christ moves among us as we love and support one another, and as we go forth to serve the needy people all around us, struggling in a world darkened by pride and fear and craving.

God the Holy Spirit knits our fellowship together and empowers each one of us with a distinct calling to serve. He gives us "spiritual gifts" which enable YOU to contribute something unique - rooted in your passion and competence and ability - to build up the whole. **St Paul calls us "the Body of Christ"** and as the body has many limbs, organs and systems working together to make the body healthy, so each of us work together to make our community whole.

With each of us growing and serving together we fulfill our full potential as God's people and do our part with Jesus to make the world new. We've been doing well at it here at St Peter's. And I believe the Spirit of Christ is *leading us to be even more faithful and effective* in the year ahead. God is so glorious and active in our midst. There are many opportunities to be part of the action here.

A big part of being a "body" means buildings and grounds. Building, maintaining, enhancing the beauty and usefulness of our structures and expanding them so our "form" better fits our "function" as God's people -called-to-mission.

The big news this summer has been the progress we've made to renovate McCray Hall. The shiny new ovens, handsome paneling, trim, painting (and coming window treatments and new floors) have transformed that space. It now does a much better job on Sunday mornings for our coffee hour fellowship, Sunday school class gatherings, and serving the groups who meet here during the week. It also makes McCray Hall much more appealing as an upscale rental venue, and the new home of Good Shepherd Montessori school.

I'm SO grateful for the work of Joe Matthews as Junior Warden, and Steve Schultz and members of the Expansion and Renovation Committee for finally moving us forward. It's been a LONG time coming! Many people have invested many dollars and dreams and good ideas and effort to make this a reality, and it's been a meandering journey getting here. That makes it all the more exceedingly exciting to finally see such progress on our facilities renovation.

Thank you all for our new McCray Hall!

For those who don't know the story behind the name "McCray" please allow me to tell you that story.

Who Was Mr. McCray?

As we discuss renovating and expanding McCray Hall some people wonder, "Who was Mr. McCray?" Here's what we know about him. Robert Janney McCray was one of our most distinguished members of Saint Peter's. He was a leader of life-long influence in the church and surrounding community.

Elected to the Vestry in 1913, at age 27, he served alongside his father, Edgar McCray. When his dad died in 1918, Vestry minutes report that he was "elected to succeed his father as Treasurer". He served on the Vestry until his death in 1964, working with 10 different rectors over 50 years.

McCray's leadership was ubiquitous. Present at virtually every Vestry meeting, his reports covered everything from the cesspool at the old Rectory, to redrawing Madison Parish boundaries. As senior Warden his hands-on leadership was instrumental in building the new Rectory in 1950, and our current facility in 1963, in which his name is immortalized.

The congregation unanimously passed the following resolution in his memory.

"Whereas: Robert Janney McCray was concerned with the erection of Saint Peter's parish house and especially interested that we have a parish hall suitable for the use of young people of the community as well as for other church activities...

"Therefore be it Resolved: That the parish hall of Saint Peter's Church be dedicated to his memory and henceforth shall be known as "McCray Hall."



McCray's influence was felt far outside the four walls of the church. At the Loudoun Hospital he served 40 years on the board, and also as president and chairman of board of trustees. A plaque in the hospital eloquently praised him: "Broad in vision, perceptive in judgment, generous in spirit and untiring in his work; a sincere person who possessed a remarkable insight into human nature. His service to the hospital was of profound importance to its development."

It was said that "The nurses loved him. Whenever there was a dispute between doctors and nurses they'd call him in to help. He had a way of resolving it very peacefully."

He worked till the day he died. Literally. He passed away at age 78 in the car driving home to Liberty Hall Farm, in Hamilton. He had just left his retirement ceremony as president of the Mutual Fire Insurance Co. of Loudoun. On his wrist was the gold watch awarded him for 50 years of service.

His granddaughter, Ann Wheeler of Charlotte, North Carolina, was with him when he died. She described her memories as a seven-year-old, sitting next to her grandfather in the car. Mr. McCray had just picked her up from school. As they inched their way through town, in traffic delayed by construction (the more things change in Purcellville the more they stay the same!), Mr. McCray suffered cardiac arrest. To his granddaughter, the sun rose and set on him. "Granddad was my best friend," she said. His death was the biggest loss of her life, and a huge loss for Saint Peter's.

St. Peter's has long been, as our Vision Statement now declares, "A city on a hill that cannot be hid... sending servants, changing the world." Robert Janney McCray was one of our brightest lights, bringing the influence of Jesus Christ into the public square in very practical ways. As a follower of Jesus he generously invested his character and gifts, his skills and wealth for the common good of our county.

Now we seek to renovate and expand the hall that bears his name, to further expand our ability to welcome, feed, and serve the people of Purcellville and members of Saint Peter's.

Whew What a Summer!

And there was also that week in June among the Mennonites in Indiana for my new board role at CMI. And remember back in April I had the CREDO conference, hosted by the Church Pension Fund, in which clergy carve out a week in a beautiful place with professional faculty to refocus and rebalance and revive our sense of call to ministry. During the week we focused on our spiritual life, financial life, physical and emotional health, and vocational priorities.

In all it was a great summer, very insightful, and a big help for me to get squared away after a challenging year, and after running hard the last five years since my sabbatical in 2011. It was good to change up the schedule, to take the summer at a different pace. I must say, however, it's nice to be back on schedule!

Notes From the Music Corner

SCHEDULE CHANGES AHEAD FOR THE CHOIR

At this moment in time, when we have spent the summer either in a spoken service or with hymns simply accompanied on the organ, it is quite appropriate to stop and think about all we might give up if we were to lose a choral presence in our corporate worship. And we need to consider this now because we have reached a point where it is no longer possible for our choir, with its current number of singers, to split between the two services. The lack of choral music, even for just one of the services, would cost us dearly in our ability to follow the exhortation found in the Bible to sing and make melody to the Lord.

First and foremost we would lose the manner in which a choir supports good congregational singing and visually encourages singing. Second, a choir presence says to all that the voice of the congregation is a primary, not secondary, element of our musical worship, encouraging full participation in our corporate music-making.

I could go on enumerating the reasons our choir is such an essential part of our worship at St. Peter's but now it is time to tell you of some changes ahead for the Choir which I hope will interest you in the light of the previous discussion.

We are a busy congregation filled with parishioners who are active and engaged in many important areas in our church's life, but in order to offer choir at both services we need additional singers to join from both services. In the past, a commitment to sing with the Choir has meant devoting 2 hours one evening each week for rehearsal as well as the warm-up before service each Sunday.

So with the hope of finding new singers for the choir, re-activating former choir members and of course retaining current ones, I would like to change our **rehearsal time and day to Sunday mornings, from 9:25 to 10:05AM.** Early service singers will warm up on Sunday mornings at 7:45, and late service singers will warm up at 10:05AM. This is a proven rehearsal pattern used in many churches with congregations of similar size and resources to ours. Those wishing to sing seasonal choir music at Christmas and Easter can make a six-week commitment to Thursday

evening rehearsals during the weeks prior to Christmas and Easter. In this way we create a time commitment for Choir members which is more in line with the other church volunteer ministries. I am hopeful this will attract additional singers and I encourage all of you to search your hearts (and schedules!) and come be a part of this tradition which has been such an important part of St. Peter's.

So that being said, I look forward to seeing many additional singers at our first meeting in the Choir Room at 9:25AM on Sunday, 11 September.

...AND FOR OUR YOUNGER SINGERS

The Chorister Program

Each year new singers -- whether rising third graders, new church families, or those who have not sung with The Choristers before -- are encouraged to join in our music-making. The reasons to have your child participate are many:

Choristers develop knowledge of the church's liturgy as they assume an active role in worship.

Choristers develop musical and vocal skills that equip them for lifelong participation in the church's music. Our church's worship is enhanced by the musical contributions of the choristers.

Choristers develop peer friendships within the church community.

A Children's Choir can serve as an out-reach opportunity for the church.

The Choristers are affiliated with the Royal School of Church Music through its Voice for Life program.

Our first rehearsal will be held in the Choir Room, September 11 at 12 noon, after the 10:30 service. The current plan is for the Choristers to sing in church on October 16, November 20, December 18 and Christmas Eve at the 5:00 service.

Our elementary aged students will continue to follow *Weaving God's Promises*. This year we explore *God's Beloved Community*. We will learn how we are called upon to live in a loving community with one another and learn what constitutes that loving community.

As always, attendance is important. We are blessed to have wonderful teachers with us who give of their time and talents. It is a challenge to teach a class when attendance is sporadic. Other obligations do come up and unfortunately, we all get sick once in a while, but this year, please try to make Sunday School a priority for your child. The following article is one that I have shared before, but I think it is a good one to revisit as we begin a new year!

There has been a lot of discussion in my circle of friends recently about the necessity of Sunday School. I've been working in children's ministry for

nearly two decades and I never thought I'd see the day when churches would consider doing away with this valuable ministry.

I know the arguments, "We need to cut costs," and "We don't have enough volunteers," but these seem small compared to the growing need for spiritual

guidance. Is this answer to remove this valuable spiritual service? I'm not convinced.

Sunday Schools may seem like "old hat" to some churches but according to Barna Research, 95% of churches still offer some type of classroom Bible

teaching—and for good reason. Barna says, "In a culture saturated with change, one of the most stable aspects in the religious sphere has been Sunday School—the weekend educational efforts that Protestant churches offer to people outside of worship services." Why? More than ever before, people need a counterweight to the massive cultural shifts that modern societies are now experiencing. More specifically, children need Sunday School ministry for these five reasons. If you're building a new ministry or revamping an established one, keep these goals in mind.

Sunday School helps children respect,

appreciate and utilize the Bible. Reverence for God's written words doesn't come naturally, sadly. A healthy Sunday classroom environment, centered around the Bible, will elevate its importance in a child's life.

Sunday School teaches children how to navigate the Bible. If a child joins the Scouts, the Scoutmaster doesn't hand him a 400 page map and say, "Good luck!" Sunday School teachers don't just teach Bible stories, they show a child how to utilize the concordance and give a basic understanding of the Bible's books and overall format.

Sunday School gives kids a chance to ask questions. Kids' church isn't designed for a detailed Q & A sessionbut Sunday classes can. Sunday School is the perfect format for in-depth discussion, even debate. This format allows teachers to give kids more good food for thought.

Sunday School develops a community of believers. Why do you think schools use the classroom method? Not just to reach more children, faster. Originally, it was because in a classroom setting, kids were more likely to help one another and push each other along in their growth. A community of children, worshipping, learning the Bible and discovering God together creates a bond that single study can't accomplish. Sunday Schools are the Petri dishes for the future church.

Sunday School plants spiritual seeds. Some of my greatest revelations concerning God's love and plan for me I received quietly in Sunday School. I'll never be able to thank the small Baptist church ministry that picked me up on the bus and carried me to Sunday School every week. Even when we moved away from that loving community of believers, I never forgot the songs, the lessons and the love. Sunday Schools are like plant nurseries, they may look unimpressive at first, but under the soil, miracles are happening.

We need Sunday Schools!

High School Sunday Formation, 2016-17: Mere Christianity

Our existence is one of confusion. No matter how much we value the truth, how often is it quite difficult to find? When we try to make sense of this world, it is so easy to get lost in the cacophony of voices telling us that their truth is the *best* truth. Unfortunately, even Christian faith has become afflicted by this confusion over the years. Even though St. Paul tells the Ephesians that we are called to "the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all", we find ourselves in a world with dozens (if not hundreds!) of differing Christian denominations and teachings.

Is it possible for us to look past this dense fog of confusion, to see the pure, unfiltered light of the Gospel?

For just a moment, step back with me into Britain, 1942. Nearly the entire planet has been immersed in the most bloody, widespread war ever known – for about 4 years now. The momentum of the war is just beginning to turn, as Britain is now partnering with the Soviets, China, and the United States to stop the advance of Axis powers. But Britain is still just a year removed from the horrific bombing raids known as the Blitz, which had killed around 40,000 civilians and destroyed countless homes, businesses, and schools. So while the English people set about rebuilding their devastated communities with heavy and (doubtlessly) uneasy hearts, a forty-four year old Irish scholar, writer, and veteran of the first Great War stepped in front of a BBC microphone to give a series of radio addresses.

This writer was our beloved C.S. Lewis, and these radio addresses would go onto become compiled into the work we now call *Mere Christianity*. In these radio talks, Lewis set about to show us a vision of Christianity, not divided by squabbles over theological or doctrinal debate, but unified over its most unaltered and simplest (merest) form.

So, inspired by Lewis' apologetic masterpiece, all high school aged youth are invited to join me for Sunday formation in the 2016-17 program year to examine how we find proof for Christianity, what Christianity really means, and how we must act as Christians. Guatemala Mission Trip, Week 2

For the past four years I have stayed in Guatemala for an additional week after our St. Peter's mission team departs. The week is supported by a partnership between St. Peter's Church and seeJesus ministries. SeeJesus is a global discipling mission that publishes interactive Bible studies and conducts seminars worldwide. One of the seeJesus courses, The Person of Jesus, has been taught almost continuously at St. Peter's for the past ten years.



This summer I worked with Barry and Marquita Staley, missionaries from

Purcellville now serving in Guatemala, and with Debora Ramirez, a Guatemalan missionary. They serve with the Independent Missionary Network which provides Biblical and church growth training to pastors and church leaders. They had previously been trained by seeJesus to lead interactive Bible studies. We taught in schools in Livingston, a small town on the Caribbean coast which can be reached only by boat because it backs up to impassable dense jungle. The population consists mainly of indigenous Mayans and the Garifuna people, descendants of African slaves. Livingston's claim to movie fame dates back to 1935 when a scene of The New Adventures of Tarzan was filmed there.

During our week we taught the story of Jesus raising the widow of Nain's son to over 700 students from six schools

from elementary through high school. We adapted our material to reach oral learners (students who prefer to learn orally rather than through reading), using skits and other oral methods. The older kids could read well but they all loved the drama and the reinforcement of the oral training. One goal of the oral training is to have the students learn the story so well that they can tell it very accurately in their own words. (Most middle class Northern Virginia kids who read the Bible only superficially do not learn the stories sufficiently well to do this!)





It was a great week. We were stranded one night in Livingston when a storm prevented us from returning by boat to our base. There was no running water in the house where we "camped out" so we were a little raunchy teaching the following day. But the food was good, the water was bottled, and the seafood was fresh at a local restaurant, Restaurante Happy Fish. The people were friendly and appreciative and hopefully God used us to touch some young lives. Perhaps more importantly, we left The Independent Missionary Network with a valuable teaching resource for additional equipping of the church.

Thank you letter from Hayes Baker

Note from Bob Loker: Several members of the St. Peter's Guatemala Mission Team received financial assistance from the Loudoun Missions Foundation to cover some of their trip expenses. Hayes Baker wrote a thank you letter to the foundation board for the funds he received in which he described his experiences. Here is his letter:

Dear Mr. Ruckman:

Thank you very much for the generous donation toward my mission trip. Following is a brief description of some of my experiences the week-long excursion.

I wanted to go down to Guatemala because I felt that it would be a fantastic way to further my faith while volunteering and helping other people firsthand. I was very excited at the thought of being able to spend an entire week helping people in need. Originally I expected that I wouldn't be able to communicate much with the locals and that I would be asked to do one job throughout the whole week, but I was wrong. The locals were understanding and helpful while I spoke broken Spanish with them and I spent the week doing a variety of different tasks with my team.

One of the very first things that I took notice of was that all of these people were so grateful for everything that we were

doing for them. They had so little compared to many of us here in the United States but had a different way of living their lives. Unlike us, they made time to be more social, build relationships, and experience life, whereas in the States we are always in a rush and always following a schedule. I never realized how different we go about our lives until experiencing it firsthand.

The next thing that amazed me was Penito, an extremely poor town built along an abandoned railroad track between two meat packing plants. Old discarded bones littered the dirt road going down the center of the town and cow carcasses hung nearby. The area is home to active gangs and the children didn't have a safe place to play until a Pastor, Rami, and his wife, Shirley, were called to start a church in the center of town. They devote their time to keeping a safe and productive place for children to stay and learn during the day and have built a place of worship accessible to the community. Pastor Rami is respected by every resident of Penito. He is even respected by the gangs of the area and I believe that it is due to what he is trying to do for the community as a whole. Pastor Rami showed me that one person can change many lives when he follows God's calling, even in dangerous places like Penito.

The final highlight of my trip was spending time with the local children of Santiago Zamora. Just as important as feeding and educating them was giving them attention and playing with them, this is something that isn't guaranteed to them in their day to day life. The children also taught me that taking the time to build relationships can have a positive impact on their lives and mine. It made me want to do more to help them and to share the gifts that God has given me.

I hope that I can take what I've learned in Guatemala and use it to better my community. I will definitely tell others about my experiences on the mission trip in hopes that they may decide to do something like this in the future. Thank you for helping to make this experience possible for me to have.

We are saddened to report that St. Peter's has lost one of our dear Liberian friends, Eric Kandakai, who befriended, supported, and fed us on all of our mission trips to Monrovia. We came to know Eric on our first mission trip to Bromley in November 2009, when he served as cook at the White Compound where the combined St. Pete's and St. James' missioners stayed. Eric provided friendship and advice, and some excellent down-home food, to nourish our weary bodies and souls during this visit only five years after the end of the Liberian civil war. Eric's involvement supporting this mission trip was key in bringing him back to Christ, as he and his family joined the St. Peter's Caldwell community.

Eric strove to provide for his growing family by starting up his own bakery and catering business, a very challenging undertaking in war-torn Liberia, but his spirit and skill helped him make a go of it, although just scraping by.

We engaged Eric again on our next mission trip in July 2012, wherein we conducted training for nearly 100 Episcopal Diocesan school teachers at B.W. Harris High School, with Eric providing lunch, with joy, each day for this entire assemblage. On our most recent trip, in February 2014, for dedication of the new St. Peter's Caldwell School, Eric provided delicious, catered breakfasts, lunches, and dinners, delivering the repast on the back of rented motorcycle space. He was always most gracious and kind. And he graciously hosted our St. Pete's Purcellville team, the Reverends Edward Gbe and Michael Sie, and the entire St. Peter's Caldwell vestry for a celebratory dinner at his new, tiny shop, of which he was so proud and we so impressed, following Sunday worship before the formal dedication of the school.

Eric passed away unexpectedly in his sleep on Wednesday, 17 August. He was 45 and leaves behind his wife, Musu, and three children, Alpheus (age 11), Morris (age 15), and Jamama (age 16). He was a delightful soul, caring and happy, and will be greatly missed. We are establishing a scholarship fund for his children. When Father Reads the Book


