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Welcome to REALM!

Have you ever wanted to view your giving to St. Peter's? See where you are with your pledge? Tell us your new phone number or address? Find a way to contact a ministry leader or parishioner? Set up secure automatic giving? Thanks to a recent software upgrade, you can now do all this, and more!



St. Peter's has recently upgraded to the new **Realm church** management software. Unlike our previous system, this one allows everyone connected to St. Peter's to securely log in and see and update information, make or add a pledge, and set up one-time or recurring automatic giving. You can also control how much (if any) of your contact information is available to anyone beyond the church staff.

You should soon be receiving an email inviting you to set up your secure access to the Realm system. Please keep an eye out for this and respond as soon as you can. You should receive your invitation no later than October 15th, but if you have not seen one by then, please contact the church office - we'll get you connected.



From the Sr. Warden—Tom Coate:

Jesus' Strangest Miracle

Peter was feeling the pinch. The tax man was on-hand demanding his pound of flesh. Times were tight and Peter didn't have enough money to cover his financial obligations.

Jesus told Peter where he might find some cash in Matthew 17:27: "Go to the sea and cast a hook and take the first fish that comes up, and when you open its mouth you will find a shekel. Take that and give it to them for me and for yourself."

Do you know what it's like to feel the pinch? If so, this strange miracle points us in a hopeful direction: our Lord provides. When we feel the pinch of scarcity, Jesus commands abundance and makes sure we have what we need.

It helps me to remember that in the current season at St. Peter's.

We are certainly feeling the pinch. The last year and a half has been hard for us. We have seen many in our congregational family **move away** (the Clavelli, O'Hara, Psaltos, Smith, Snyder families, Peter Forbes, Lydia Holt, Dave Tocki, David Weiss, Muriel Truax, Jesse Brown). We have seen several notables **pass away** (Esther Kilgour, Jane & A.D. Bogle, Fred Shier, Alfred DiZerga, Harry Lane, Rick Clark). And we have watched as many **walk away** (the Erich, Frichtl, Hegener, Israel, Lee and Miller families). All together, these people represent 10% of our congregation, and their empty pews remind us of their absence. These people's generosity also represents \$65,000 in revenue that we lost, with them.

That loss accounts for much of the current \$56,000 deficit we are currently struggling with. Furthermore, when budgeting for 2016 we stretched ourselves, in faith, in order to hire our Youth Minister at 15 hours per week. These facts indicate that, in the short term, this deficit will not fix itself. It is structural.

At this point we face some choices:

- 1) Ignore. We could carry on, hoping it will go away.
- Retrench. Cut staff, and get used to being a smaller church.
- 3) Get hot. Surge forward, and raise a lot of money.
- 4) Inquire: what if God designed this situation to lead us to a good turning-point as a congregation?

Well, friends, after a season of doing 1, we are vigorously opting for 3, while beginning to contemplate 2. Our congregation will need to be very committed, creative

and concerted as we "get hot" to bridge the budget gap in the months ahead. You'll be hearing a lot about that in the months ahead. (See box.) But I'd like to take some time here to talk about 4 with you. When times are tough we grow the most. How is God trying to shape us as a people...THROUGH this situation we are in?

How would he like to change ME as pastor of St. Peter's?

How would he like to change US as leaders of St. Peter's?

How would he like to change us as the PEOPLE of St. Peter's?

I'd love to hear your thoughts. Like Peter learning to trust Jesus in the financial pinch, we usually take our biggest strides of insight, growth and progress when we feel the pinch too. It's going to take all of us together to Get Hot and Reflect, because Ignore is no longer an option...at ALL.

Going forward, we've got so much to work with...I've been here 14 years and I believe we've never been better positioned to thrive.

We've got the *very best vestry leadership team* since I've been here. God has blessed us with a vestry that combines some highly seasoned and committed pros (like Dell, Traci, Tom, Linda, Peter, Tanya as Treasurer) with some very energetic and committed people relatively new to vestry leadership (Jon, Ron, Jim, Joe). This crew has showed their commitment by meeting weekly for the first two months of their term to complete our Hedgehog work. They have climbed on board with the reality of our structural deficit and are getting hot to address it with creativity and optimism. What a magnificent bunch!

We also have our **best staff team**. Our Lord has blessed us with Chris Daniels as our part time Facilities Manager. He and the rest of the staff has very competently done the brain and brawn work needed to bring Good Shepherd Montessori school successfully into our facilities. The year we had Dr. Andrea Lee as our consultant for Youth Ministry yielded great insight to improve our youth ministry. With Jon Coate as Director of Youth Ministries we are moving forward. By all signs the kids love him and a great Christian community is growing again among our teens.

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Treasurer's Corner—Tanya Matthews

Thank you for increasing your giving, and for more and more people signing up for e-giving. We have had a 20% increase in "on line" giving. Several people have contributed to the budget deficit, for which we are all thankful. I've sent out "thank you" notes to people who have taken this step.

Our shortfall continues to increase. There have only been a couple of Sundays when we've collected the amount we budgeted. Our annual stewardship campaign will launch shortly under Linda Stoutenburgh's able leadership (see page 4). In addition, Steve Schultz has formed a fund-raising committee, and it's beginning to take some creative steps to find new revenue sources (see page 7).



By simply using this link on our website to get to Amazon, it gives St. Peter's a 6% (or more) cut of your purchase price—at No Cost to you.

- 3) Under the heading, Support, you will see an icon of a shopping cart.
- 4) Click on Amazon Support St. Peter's when you click here to shop on Amazon
- 5) Shop as usual. 6% or more of your purchase price will be automatically sent to St. Peter's and it costs you nothing!

(NOTE: Using the link on our website to shop at Amazon gives the church a higher percentage than using Amazon Smile, but we'll take that, too!)

Here is some data on our Amazon results. Since we signed on in 2008, we've received a total of \$1,402.23 from Amazon. That's not a huge sum, but it's not bad since it's only been the result of a small number of people.

We are currently receiving 6% on most products. (There are special rules for certain types of 3rd party items, specific media items, etc, but the 6% applies to most purchases.) The percentage varies depending on how much is sold through our account each month. For example, if we have 23 more items purchased by the end of September, our September payout will rise to 6.5%.

To give St. Peter's credit for your shopping, use the link on the St. Pete's home page. You will not see anything different from your usual shopping experience. Your Prime membership, one-click shopping and all those fun things will all work as usual.

Please keep this in mind for your upcoming Christmas shopping, too!

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We also have our **best-ever plan** to reach our community. Jesus blessed and guided the Hedgehog Team which gathered 40 people working at different times for nearly 2 years to revise the old Strategic Plan and discern our path forward. They've come up with a specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time-bound plan to serve our community in compelling new ways in the next five years, "Turning strangers into friends into followers of Jesus". This plan is broadbased within our congregation, is rooted in research out in our community, and was bathed with prayer every step of the way. I believe it offers a blueprint of the long-term structural changes that will bring us out of our current season of loss.

In the short term, we have also welcomed **many new people** to our family. We are blessed to have the Bailey, Casey, Chambers, Daly, Falatko, Grisius, Marsh, Neely, O'Neil, Nikosey, Smith, and Stagg families, Patti

Costantino, Lynne McCann, and Stephanie and Natalie Zullinger joined us in the same period. We look forward to their full integration in the life of our congregation.

Viewed in this light, our current financial pinch is a season full of opportunity. The solution to our structural problem lies in: 1) the Hedgehog plan we have spent two years discerning, 2) the leaders who have crafted and will help us implement it, 3) the people of St. Peter's, both new and old, who are joining arm-in-arm to devote ourselves to one another and to becoming "fishers of men," like old St. Peter, in the Loudoun Valley.

In a pinch, Jesus told Peter to cast his line into the sea and to find his provision there. That's what he's asking us to do in the months and years ahead. Together let's cast our fishing nets into our community in the Loudoun Valley, "Turning strangers into friends into followers of Jesus." He will provide in the pinch. And we will be changed in the process.

Money Messages

We will be talking about money in the season ahead, in three basic messages:

- 1. *Give with Jesus.* It's the stewardship message Linda Stoutenburgh shares below. We give out of gratitude, to become the person God made us to be. You'll be asked to "walk in love" pledging your time, talent and treasure as part of your journey with Jesus in the year ahead.
- 2. **Make great things happen.** It's the investment message of our ministries and our Hedgehog plan. We give out of eager good will to make an impact in the world around us. You'll be invited to participate in creative fundraisers for ministry initiatives in the year ahead.
- 3. **Make us whole.** It is the message of "being there" for each other to help in a time of need. We give to pitch in and aid our family feeling the pinch. You will be invited to find ways to give sacrificially to bridge the structural gap in our budget in the months ahead.

An Offering and Sacrifice

"Stewardship season" is upon us – that time of year when we take a concerted look at what Christian Stewardship is, what it means for us and our spiritual lives and practice, and then with hearts and minds freshly reminded and inspired to give, we wrap up our examination of stewardship with the opportunity to make our annual giving pledges to St. Peter's.



To that end, on October 9th we will begin a six-week series of stewardship-oriented bulletin inserts, and "Ministry Moment" presentations at the announcement time. Rather than explicit teaching about stewardship, these Ministry Moments are meant to highlight the many things we can do when we are good stewards of time, talent, and treasure. These moments are meant to inspire, and to show what it can mean to "Walk in Love," which is the theme of the Diocese's stewardship program theme for this year.

"Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God." (Ephesians 5:2)

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Ephesians 5:2

This verse of scripture should be at least a little familiar, as it is one of several offering sentences in the prayer book that serve as our invitation to give. It will also be the one Father Tom will use during our stewardship focus, as an additional cue to think about our life of giving.

And what is this notion of giving all about anyway? Why do we give? Why does God desire for us to give? How much should we give? What does it mean to give as a "sacrifice" to God?

At its heart, Christian giving has to do with who we are. We are creatures that God created in his own image. Since God is love, and love is generous and giving and so many other things, then we as creatures in that image should also behave with love and generosity, giving of ourselves and all that we are and all that we have. We are wired to give!

We are also God's people, and God's inspired Word in scripture shows us that the tithe (one-tenth) of the first fruits has always been the understood norm for giving to God. In our day, "first fruits" is no longer to do with agricultural produce (usually!), but instead giving from our income – and doing our giving to God "off the top", before we do our other spending. That giving, that tithe, is our acknowledgement that as God-created creatures, everything we think we have (including our very souls and bodies) actually belongs to God. We acknowledge God's lordship by giving back from what we have been graciously given. And in addition, God used the tithe as the mechanism for supporting the temple and the priests, and then synagogues, and in our day to support the church. So tithing has both spiritual and practical meaning and purpose.

God's desire for us is that we grow more and more into the likeness of his son, Jesus. As believers, we are already viewed as though we were like Jesus. We are already given credit for Jesus' work of perfect obedience and love on the cross which purchased salvation from our sins at great personal cost and sacrifice. And this is where the "sacrificial" part of giving comes in.

Before he died, Jesus ALREADY lived a perfect life: loving God, fulfilling the law, giving his tithe offering to the temple. But FOR OUR SAKES, he had to do one thing more – he had to suffer our death. His death was the sacrifice, the above-and-beyond, the "more". As we consider the call to Walk in Love as Jesus did, then need to keep his "more" in our hearts and minds, so that we can hear where we are being called to "more" ourselves.

Depending on our circumstances, our "more" will vary. Some are called to give more time in serving. Some are called to give more of their treasure – their money. But as we grow and mature into the image of Jesus, we will all be called make our lives a sacrifice, to step into the realm of "more" – more than the average and expected.

In a time of financial difficulty, it's easy to let stewardship and sacrificial giving devolve into just another plea for money. For Christians, giving is NEVER just about the money – where we put our money (and our use of time and talent) shine light on inclinations of heart that we may not wish to admit to. The call to give is always an opportunity for growth.

My prayer for St. Peters over the next weeks until our Pledge In-gathering on November 13th, is that those who have not had the courage to commit to a pledge will find the trust and faith in God to do so; that those who give a percentage less than the tithe will find the desire to step up and increase their amount, and that more people than ever will embrace the tithe. And besides all that, that many of you will examine your hearts and your bank accounts and consider if this may be a time to attempt an additional, sacrificial gift as we strive to correct our budgetary shortfall and correct our course going forward.

If anyone has any questions about stewardship, tithing, sacrificial giving, I would be honored to discuss these topics with you personally and confidentially – just ask!

Rector's FAQ

In the midst of recent efforts to address our financial short-fall several excellent questions have surfaced that I'd like to address. I'm eager to share. Many of these questions were forwarded to me with the request that they be anonymous. As eager as I am to answer everyone's questions I wish they didn't come from the shadows of anonymity. I'd like everyone in our church family to feel free to voice their opinions, ideas, objections, and questions in a culture of openness and discussion. How else are we all going to feel included and valued and part of the team? How else are we going to get the best of everyone's input as we figure out our way forward together? Please feel free to share and ask!

Has Tom moved out of the community and what about the rectory?

Ever since we first moved to Loudoun, Tait and I have wanted to own a home, and build equity for the future, rather than live in the rectory. As our family has grown, the need has been more urgent for a house larger than the 1900 square foot Rectory. It's been a long journey but finally, after many prior attempts, we found a house we could afford in the area...in Berryville. With some inheritance money we bought a spacious and beautiful home in summer of 2015, provided basic furnishings, and transitioned our kids in Clarke County Schools. That worked well. It has been difficult, however, for us to move out of the Rectory. The location in Purcellville is very convenient to large parts of our life. And it has taken longer than expected to get everything squared away with the house in Berryville. We basically live as though we have a "weekend home" in Purcellville. Once we consolidate into one home, the rental value of the Rectory will become the housing allowance for the rector.

Why does the Rectory look unkempt?

The rectory exterior was last painted in 2008. It is obviously due for another, particularly the black shutters which have begun peeling. The bricks could also use a good pressure washing. To save money, the Simmons family would be willing to do this.

Where was Tom this summer?

The Summer of '16 was different from all others! (See the September issue of *The Good News.*) Used to be I'd take off a week each, after Christmas and Easter, and two weeks at the end of July for vacation, followed by a week on retreat in August. This year, however, we stayed put after Christmas and Easter to welcome visitors who came back the Sunday after the big seasonal services. And instead of two weeks at the beach it was one...in early July!

I spent my annual prayer retreat prepping for my big teaching weekend at Officer's Christian Fellowship in early August. And there was also that week in June that I spent among the Mennonites in Indiana for my new board role Coaching Mission International. I've not usually been gone in June. And remember back in April I had the CREDO conference,



hosted by the Church Pension Fund, in which clergy carve out a week in a beautiful place with professional faculty to refocus and rebalance and revive our sense of call to ministry? So the timing of the weeks was very different and seemed more frequent this year than in the past. In all, a very different rhythm.

For all that it was a great summer, very insightful. It helped me recreate and get squared away after a challenging year, and after running hard the last five years since my sabbatical in 2011. It was good to change up the schedule, to take the summer at a different pace. I must say, however, it's nice to be back on schedule!

What happened with the potential purchase of the house next door?

First, allow me to provide a little background. In recent years we have been working to better understand our current and future real estate needs. Growth projections for the area make it clear that our facilities will need to support considerably more space for education, fellowship, administration, and parking in the years to come. In 2014, the Vestry and Renovation Expansion Committee commissioned architectural firm of Lemay Erickson to provide a conceptual design to expand McCray hall and the education and office wing of the church, and to modernize our facility. This effort made it clear that the current 2.1-acre property is inadequate for any building expansion. We need, therefore, to either acquire land adjacent to St. Peters, or find a new building site for the future.

Figuring that the former will be the preferable path, the Renovation and Expansion Committee made an offer to our neighbor to the north to arrange for the future (within the next 10 years) purchase of his property. The owner is not yet ready to commit to a specific timeline, but indicated that when he would be happy to discuss the matter again. We plan to raise the question with him again in two years' time. In the mean time we will focus on more near-term renovation projects within our existing property, like McCray Hall and the basketball court, as we explore ways to make St. Peter's a "focal-point for families" in Purcellville.

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What happened with Andrea Lee?

Jae and Andrea came to St. Peter's two years ago eager to help. We hired Andrea to serve as Youth Minister, at 5 hours per week, beginning with a one-year trial. During that year she decided that she would limit her service to one year and assume a sort of consultant role, asking, listening and observing the culture and programs and people that compose our ministry with youth. The result was a very helpful, comprehensive analysis and set of recommendations for organizing youth ministry in the future.

Jae and Andrea also decided during that trial year that they would not stay at St. Peter's. The reasons they gave me were: 1) our decision to host a school at St. Peter's conflicted with her commitment to the public school system. 2) There are "socio-political differences" between the values the Lee's hold and that many at St. Peter's hold. Regrettably, for the Lee's, those differences were a reason to move on from our fellowship.

One of the great recommendations Andrea made was to explore the possibility of hiring Jon Coate as our next Youth Minister. We hired Jon for 15 hours a week of work. He has taken to the work with alacrity since July, with Kristin at his side, and results are indicating his effectiveness. The teen Sunday School class is larger than it has ever been and, in the first three weeks has seen barely any attendance attrition.

How much does it cost to have a seminarian?

They say good help is hard to find. With our seminarians, however, the truism does not hold true. For the next two years we will benefit from high quality ministry of Michael Whitnah...at an excellent price! Each semester we reimburse the seminarian \$600 to cover his prodigious travel expenses. He makes the trip to and from Alexandria roughly six times each month. There's no better deal!

What is the plan for Brother John?

For the last year we have been discerning with John Ogle the possibility of him moving from Richmond to our area and becoming an every-week part of our parish leadership team. As a monk of limited means the challenge was arranging his housing. In the end our financial straits and his own discernment of his life and timing converged to make it clear that he wouldn't be moving up here in the foreseeable future. So we will continue to enjoy Brother John's presence and ministry on Healing Sundays.

Why is the Good Shepherd School using McCray Hall and not the classroom space downstairs?

The school is occupying McCray Hall because it is the optimum space for their education method and their staffing situation. The Montessori education method is hands-on rather than desk-bound. It involves multiple work areas where children learn by doing, at their own pace. That requires a lot of space for each child, in contrast to traditional education which largely confines children to work at a single desk. As for the staffing situation for Good Shepherd School, at this time they only have one teacher and one aide. These two remarkable women must manage the group of children together at all times. This requires a single space large enough to accommodate all the learning stations. In other words, it requires McCray Hall, rather than two classrooms downstairs. The school hopes to add more grades and more staff, which will enable them to expand into the downstairs spaces.

Excitement for St Peters

The Vestry has created a Fundraising Committee to help address the current deficit. Led by Steve Schultz, others serving on the committee are Jim Schatz, Paul Donohue, and Regina Brzozowsky. (We put the FUN in FUNdraising!)

New and exciting things will be taking place at St. Peters starting this October. Each month, two people will be given the opportunity to win some extra cash. That's right, cash! How are we going to do this?



We will be holding a monthly 50/50 raffle drawing, winners to be drawn at the last Wednesday service of the month. YOU DO NOT NEED TO BE PRESENT TO WIN!! At each coffee hour, there will be a jar or box for people wishing to participate. For each ticket you enter, a \$2 fee is given, three tickets

Missions Corner—Orality in Guatemala 2016

Before writing was developed, cultures passed along their cultural traditions, including their history, identity, and religion, through their stories. These included proverbs, poems, songs, riddles, etc. These are all oral art forms; that is, they are spoken, sung or chanted. They were (and still are) often woven into ceremonies, dramas and rites of passage. Purely oral societies pass along everything that matters from one generation to another without putting anything into writing. The word for this ancient phenomenon is orality. It continues to the present. (https://orality.imb.org/basic/)

Oral learners also include people from all walks of life and all levels of education who learn primarily or exclusively through oral, not textual While some oral communicators learn this way out of necessity because they cannot read or write with understanding, others simply prefer non-print forms of communication. This is true of rural Guatemala. Studies have shown that 80% of the world's populations are oral learners - that is approximately 5.7 billion people!

The International Orality Network (ION) is an affiliation of agencies and organizations working together with the common goal of making God's Word available to oral learners in their native language in culturally appropriate ways. ION is part of the Lausanne Movement and grew out of the Lausanne Committee for World Evangelism in 2004. ION has since grown to be a global network of over 2,000 organizations. These include such major ministries as Wycliff Bible Translators, Christian Missionary Alliance Church, Pioneers, The Seed International Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, WYAM, and Cru (previously known as Campus Crusade for Christ). (https://orality.net/)

Last spring I took a Cru training course to learn how to develop oral Bible stories and how to train others to share them. We developed story sets from Matthew through Revelation that presented the gospel in a way that is Biblically accurate, naturally told, and appropriate to We have found that young children can learn these stories, sometime faster than adults.



Telling the Story For the past two years St. Peter's has partnered with seeJesus ministries in sharing the gospel with oral learners through story telling in Guatemala. Last summer I spent one week with a team from St. Peter's and a second week working alongside and training missionaries to tell stories from our seeJesus curriculum. To reinforce the Bible stories we used such aids as crafts, drama, puppets, hand motions and "statues". ("Statues" involves having a series of participants "freeze" like a statue illustrating an action or emotion as the storyteller narrates a Bible story, thus creating a sequential line of living statues which helps the audience remember the sequence of

the story.) The photos illustrate some of the storytelling techniques we have used in Guatemala.

WALL HANGING


Make this with — and for — a special friend.
