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

Advent Season

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From Holiday Muzak to Advent Mystery

Oh my, it's that time of year again! 'Tis the season to be... busu. are reminded of it every time you pull into any shopping center or mall parking lot.

Festooning lampposts and store facades

everywhere are the cultural symbols of our holidays. No sooner does Halloween end than they put up images of Santa, snow-flakes, gigantic candy-canes and overburdened Christmas trees. In case you missed it, Christmas Is Coming. It's your money they are after and they'll use holiday cheer to separate you from it.

About this time you begin planning your own Christmas logistics. There is so much to do! Think of the gifts to be bought, the decorations to be displayed, the cookies to be baked, the cards to be sent, the Church programs to be organized, the presents to be wrapped, and the parties attended. It makes me tired just thinking of it.

As Christians, though, we know there is more to preparing for Christmas than the bustle of shopping, cooking, decorating and spend, spend, spending. We live a very different sort of story. Amid the noise of Christmas in secular America, set to the "Holiday" muzak piped into shopping malls, we hear the ancient rhythm of Advent. "For those who have an ear to hear, let them hear." The four weeks of Advent call us out of chaotic

bustle, to "Prepare ye the way of the Lord." We are to anticipate Christ's coming with the expectation of Anna and Simeon, the contrite discipline of John the Baptist, and the wonder and surrender of Mary. With these great saints, we look to the Advent of Christ, both in his Incarnation, celebrated in the holy feast of Christmas, and his return in majesty.

At his Incarnation, the Son of God was born a helpless babe. The Son of God became Mary's son. He entered the world so through him the world might be reconciled to God. He was born a King of David's line and two thousand years later you and I are a part of the glorious Kingdom he established. In the Christmas season we cast our eyes back to that Child born in that manger on that night when it all began.

In Advent our gaze looks forward as well. anticipate the completion of Christ's reconciling work, the completion of his work overcoming evil, and the renewal of all things. When he comes again, Jesus trades the swaddling cloth for the robe of glory, the manger for the throne, and the company of sheep and cattle for the throng of nations.

Christian are Our lives as bracketed transformed by these two earth-shaking events in history. Demonstrate that fact in the way you live. In these four weeks before Christmas carve out some time for you and your family for retelling the ancient story, for quiet reflection and prayer, and renewing your commitment to the Lord of History.

Don't let the rhythm of Advent be drowned by the cacophony of Christmas preparation. We'll begin on December 3 with a special Advent Wreath making session after church.

Advent Wreaths—A Bit of History

Centuries ago in the cold, dark, winter days in Scandinavia, lighted candles were placed around a wheel, and prayers were offered to the god of light to turn "the wheel of the earth" back toward the sun to lengthen the days and restore warmth. By the Middle Ages, Christians had adapted this tradition and used Advent wreaths as part of their spiritual preparation for Christmas. After all, Christ is "the Light that came into the world" to dispel the darkness of sin and to radiate the truth and love of God (see John 3:19-21).


Research by Prof. Haemig of Luther Seminary, St. Paul, indicates that Johann Hinrich Wichern, a Protestant pastor in Germany and a pioneer in urban mission work among the poor, was the inventor of the modern Advent wreath in the early 19th century. During Advent, children at the mission school Rauhes Haus, would ask daily if Christmas had arrived. In 1839, he built a large wooden ring (made out of an old cartwheel) with 24 small red and 4 large white candles. A small candle was lit sequentially every weekday and Saturday during Advent. On Sundays, a large white candle was lit. The custom gained ground among Protestant churches in Germany and evolved into the smaller wreath with four or five candles known today.

The Advent wreath is a circle of evergreens placed on a table or suspended from the ceiling by ribbons.

The components of the Advent wreath contain beautiful symbolism. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life found in Christ. The wreath is made of various evergreens, representing eternal life and a reminder that God is unchangeable. The evergreens frequently used each have symbolic meaning: The laurel signifies victory over persecution and suffering; pine, holly,



and yew, immortality; and cedar, strength and healing. The prickly leaves of holly remind us of the crown of thorns. Any pine cones,



nuts, or seedpods used to decorate the wreath also symbolize life and resurrection.

The light from the candles in the wreath signifies Christ, the Light of the world. Four of the candles represent the four weeks of Advent and, also, each week represents one thousand years, which adds up to the 4,000 years from Adam and Eve until the Birth of the Savior. Individually, the candles symbolize: hope (week one), also called the prophets' candle; peace (week two), also called the angels' candle; joy (week three), also called the shepherds' candle; and love (week four), also called the Bethlehem candle.

Three candles are purple (because in antiquity, purple dye was very expensive and it was the color of royalty and we are preparing for the coming of the King), and one is rose. The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken during Advent. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, (from the Latin word meaning "to rejoice") because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of His second coming. The fifth candle, or Christ candle, represents Christ and is white. It is placed in the middle of the wreath, and is lit on Christmas Eve.

The tradition of the family gathered around the table before a meal, lighting Advent candles, saying Advent prayers and sharing appropriate readings helps us to prepare our hearts for the coming of the Christ Child -- - as for many centuries God prepared the world for the birth of Jesus. A good tradition to continue in our families as it helps us remain vigilant in our homes and not lose sight of the true meaning of Christmas. We hope you and your family will join us in making your own Advent wreath on Sunday, December 3, at noon.

Dear Friends,

As we work our way through the Stewardship Season, we continue to need your awareness and help on three fronts to assure that our church is financially sound and able to deliver the services that God is calling us to.

2017 Giving – We are currently about \$15,000 short of making our income goal of \$482,000 for fiscal year 2017. To this end, we are asking people behind in giving to please do your best to catch up. Finishing this year on or ahead of our giving budget is very important to restoring staff salaries and other services that were put on hold this past year.

We would like to receive remaining pledges in the next two weeks so the Vestry can make a good budget in December. We are working hard this year to provide a deeper sense of stability to fund our core programs and expenses so that non-pledged giving can be used to grow our ministries and fund needed maintenance that has been deferred for past few years. We need your help.

E-Giving – E-Giving is the future of how effective churches achieve stable income and St. Peters would like to get there. If you are not currently giving electronically, please consider doing so. Automating your giving frees you from check-writing on Sunday mornings and provides a more stable way for St. Peters to manage its income.


A Fat Mysterious Tome

The Old Testament is a fat book with a complex story line, from a place far, far away. No wonder it is unfamiliar to so many Episcopalians.

This year we are working to remedy that.

We've got to grasp the meaning of the Old Testament. Without that, we have a very hard time understanding Jesus, his life and times, or the birth of the church. The Hebrew scriptures, after all, were their Bible, before the New Testament was written.



From Fall through Easter we are working our way through Joshua, Judges, the life of David, the divided monarchy up to the Exile in Babylon. It's a dramatic story of colorful characters, the rise and fall of empires, the tragedy of human sin, the miracle of divine love, and the power of hope to change the world. And it all speaks with relevance to our own time and lives.

Jon Corbett developed this handy outline to give us the big picture of the story's sweep.

Patriarchs (Fathers): 2000-1700 BC

Genesis – God creates humanity; the problem of human sin; followed by a story of God's response to human sin Key figure: Abraham - God calls Abraham around 2000 BC

God to Abraham: "I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and him who dishonors you I will curse, and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed" Genesis 12:2-3

Abraham had 12 great grandsons, whose descendants become "a great nation" known as the 12 tribes of Israel. A famine drove them to Egypt for refuge, where they eventually became slaves for 400 years.

Exodus and Conquest: 1450-1300 BC

Exodus –God rescues his people, from slavery in Egypt. God sends Moses, who brings plagues on Egypt to convince Pharaoh to let the Hebrew people go.

Key figure: Moses. God calls Moses at the burning bush, be a prophet to lead the Israel out of Egypt.

Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy: 40 years of Desert wandering of the Hebrew People. God makes a covenant to rule the Hebrew People, giving them the Law on Mount Sinai and to bring them back to the land God promised to Abraham.

Joshua – following Moses' death Joshua leads Israelites in military conquest of the promised land. They finish most of the job, but some of the Canaanites their gods remain to entice Israel from serving Yahweh.

Judges: 1300-1050 BC

The cycle of decline begins. The story is told in Judges, Ruth, the beginning of 1 Samuel. The them is that without established leadership Israel kept abandoning God for idols. Without God's protection, Israel faced invasion and defeat.

God would raise up a leader, or "judge," who would rescue the Israelites from danger.

United Kingdom: 1050-950

Though God intended to be their King, Israelites wanted a man to rule them. God granted that request, first with wicked Saul, then with righteous David.

The books of 1 Samuel, 2 Samuel, 1 Kings (partial), 1 Chronicles, and part of 2 Chronicles show how David and Solomon consolidated the power of Israel and restored the worship of God in Jerusalem.

God's promise to David: 2 Samuel 7. Partial – "And your house and your kingdom shall be made sure forever before me. Your throne shall be established forever."

David was anointed as king. The Hebrew term for anointed one is 'messiah,' a significant title later given to Jesus, as David's long-awaited heir. The king was savior of his people.

Divided Kingdom: 950-586 BC

This heart-breaking story is told in 1 and 2 Kings, 2 Chronicles and many of the prophetic books (e.g. Isaiah, Joel, Hosea, ect...)

10 ½ tribes in the North, rebel and form their own Kingdom, called "Israel." The Southern Kingdom, made up of Judah, Benjamin and ½ the tribe of Simeon was known as "Judah."

The Southern Kingdom maintained David's heir on the throne and the true worship of God in the Temple in Jerusalem. The northern Kingdom appoints their own King and sets up an alternative center of worship.

Judah-South Israel- North

Exile 586-539 BC

Includes Biblical Books of Daniel, Esther, Obadiah, and Lamentations. God warned the people of Judah that they would be exiled from the land, if they were unfaithful. They the same cycle of abandonment and leading to invasion by Empire of Babylon who took the Jewish people captive to the land of Babylon. The exile lasted 70 years. The temple, and much of Jerusalem were destroyed.

Post-Exile: 539 BC to the Time of Jesus Christ.

Biblical Books include: Ezra, Nehemiah, Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi.

In 539 BC, the Jews are allowed to return to Jerusalem, where they rebuild temple and the city.

But there is no King of David, no Messiah, on the throne, which made Jews wonder: "What about God's promise to David of a King always on the throne?"


Though they have returned to the Promised Land the Jews are dominated by pagan empires. They wonder: "Did the exile REALLY end? How will God's promises to Abraham and Moses and David and Isaiah be fulfilled?"

These questions hang heavy in the air in the time when Jesus of Nazareth was born. In the pages of the New Testament they are answered in surprising ways, with astonishing clarity.

Make Christmas Ornaments

Make Christmas ornaments for your tree or to give as gifts.

Materials you need:

- ★ a Styrofoam ball
- * glitter
- ★ white craft glue
- * a small art brush
- ★ fishing line or thin string
- ★ decorative holiday napkins
- ★ scissors
- ★ large paper-clip
- * small amount of water
- ★ small paper cup
- * newspaper to work on

Directions:

- 1. Lay out the newspaper to cover your work area.
- 2. Open a napkin all the way and cut out the design.
- 3. Put some glue in the paper cup and mix in a few drops of water to thin it. Use the brush to stir.
- 4. Spread some of the thin glue on one half of the ball.
- 5. Place the napkin's design (face out) on the glued half of the ball. Press gently to smooth.
- 6. Carefully brush glue over the picture.
- 7. Repeat on the other side of the ball.
- 8. Roll the ball in the glitter.
- 9. Let dry completely.
- 10. Use the paper-clip to drill a hole through the ball.
- 11. Thread the fishing line or string through the hole and tie the ends to make a big loop.
